

Overview of Macao

Population: 688,100

Legal Tender: Macao Pataca

Official Languages: Chinese and Portuguese

Geographical Area: Situated at the mouth of the Pearl River Delta and bordering Guangdong Province, Macao is 60 kilometres from Hong Kong. It comprises the Macao peninsula and two islands: Taipa and Coloane. Due to reclamation along its coastline, Macao's total land area has grown from 11.6 square kilometres in 1912, when measurements were first taken, to 33.4 square kilometres in 2025. The campus of the University of Macau accounts for one square kilometre. To support Macao's sustainable economic and social development, the Central People's Government approved in 2015 the demarcation of 85 square kilometres of territorial waters for the Macao Special Administrative Region (MSAR).

Development Positioning: The MSAR Government closely aligns with the nation's 15th Five-Year Plan and fully implements the Outline Development Plan for the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area. While sticking to the development positioning of "One Centre, One Platform, and One Base" (developing Macao into a world tourism and leisure centre, as well as a trade cooperation platform between China and Portuguese-speaking countries, and a multicultural exchange and cooperation base with Chinese culture as the mainstream), the Government is pressing ahead with the construction of the Guangdong-Macao In-depth Cooperation Zone in Hengqin and striving to facilitate the "1+4" strategy¹ for diversified industrial development.

Precise Connector between China and Portuguese-speaking Countries: As a service platform for trade and economic cooperation between China and Portuguese-speaking countries, the MSAR boasts unique advantages. With strong support from the Central Government, the Forum for Economic and Trade Co-operation between China and Portuguese-speaking Countries (Macao) was established in Macao in October 2003. Its aim is to strengthen economic and trade exchanges between China and Portuguese-speaking countries, leverage Macao's role as a platform connecting China and Portuguese-speaking countries, and promote the common development of the Chinese mainland, Portuguese-speaking countries, and the MSAR. From 2003 to 2025, the Forum has successfully held six ministerial-level meetings and one extraordinary ministerial-level meeting. Macao's platform functions have been continuously improved, and it has basically formed a comprehensive service platform centred on economic and trade cooperation services, with coordinated development and joint promotion in areas such

as scientific research, traditional Chinese medicine, culture, tourism, conventions and exhibitions, trade, finance, and youth entrepreneurship. In building this platform, Macao has fully utilised its own advantages, playing the role of a “precise connector”, and has achieved fruitful results in promoting exchanges and cooperation between China and Portuguese-speaking countries. The headquarters of the China-Portuguese-speaking Countries Cooperation and Development Fund was established in Macao; the China-Portuguese-speaking Countries Entrepreneurs Association was founded in Macao; the Complex of Commerce and Trade Cooperation Platform for China and Portuguese-speaking Countries was completed and put into use; and the construction of three centres — the Portuguese-speaking Countries Food Distribution Centre, the China-Portuguese-speaking Countries Economic and Trade Cooperation Exhibition Centre, and the China-Portuguese-speaking Countries SME Trade and Service Centre — have made good progress. Meanwhile, measures to build a financial services platform for China-Portuguese-speaking countries, a RMB clearing centre for Portuguese-speaking countries, a cultural exchange centre for China-Portuguese-speaking countries, and a bilingual talent training base for China-Portuguese-speaking countries — are being gradually implemented. In early 2025, the MSAR Government and the Executive Committee of the Guangdong-Macao In-Depth Cooperation Zone in Hengqin jointly established the China-Portuguese-speaking (Spanish-speaking) Countries Economic and Trade Service Centre to help Chinese mainland enterprises “go global” and attract international investors to settle in Macao and Hengqin. In 2025, Macao's exports to Portuguese-speaking countries were worth nearly 3 million patacas, while imports from Portuguese-speaking countries were worth 1.47 billion patacas.

A Window for Mutual Learning between Eastern and Western Civilisations: As one of the earliest gateways for interaction between China and the world, Macao is imbued with a rich and profound cultural heritage. With mainstream traditional Chinese culture at its core, complemented by a vibrant tapestry of diverse cultures including Western influences, Macao exudes a unique appeal and magnetism, serving as an exemplar of East-West cultural exchange and integration. The Historic Centre of Macao was inscribed on the World Heritage List in 2005; the Archives and Materials of the Macao Diocese from 1550s to 1800s was included in the UNESCO's Memory of the World Register for Asia-Pacific; in 2017 and 2023, the collection of “Chapas Sínicas” (Official Records of Macao During the Qing Dynasty (1693-1886)) and the Archives and Manuscripts of Macau Kong Tac Lam Temple (1645–1980) were successfully inscribed on the international register of the Memory of the World, respectively. In 2025, the Archives and Manuscripts of the Macao Kiang Wu Hospital Charitable Association (1857-1961) was inscribed on the national register of the UNESCO Memory of the World. Macao currently has 11 items on the National Intangible Cultural Heritage List. In 2025, Macao was awarded the title Culture City of East Asia, bringing a distinctive profile (“golden calling card”) to Macao as an international metropolis.

Governance: The MSAR firmly implements the executive-led system under the “one country, two systems” framework. The Chief Executive and the MSAR Government assume full leadership responsibility for the MSAR. With the active support and cooperation of the legislative and judicial organs, the institutional advantages of each entity performing its own duties, assuming its own responsibilities, and cooperating with each other are fully realised. This forms a strong governance synergy in the MSAR, which helps formulate and implement policies and measures that conform to the long-term interests of Macao, laying a solid

foundation for the steady progress, prosperity and stability of the economy and society. Deepening public administration reform and promoting appropriate economic diversification are the two main tasks of the MSAR Government. While continuously improving the governance efficiency of the MSAR, the Government will join hands with the general public to promote high-quality development in all undertakings of the MSAR, realising the beautiful vision of a law-based Macao, a vibrant Macao, a culturally rich Macao, and a happy Macao.

External Cooperation: In accordance with the Basic Law of the Macao SAR, the MSAR may take part in activities of international organisations under the designation “Macao, China” or as a member of the Chinese delegation to maintain its special international status. The MSAR Government proactively develops external cooperation and exchanges in a bid to continuously improve the level of opening-up. It maintains trade with over 120 countries and regions, and participates in more than 190 international organisations.

At present Macao has established sister-city or twinning relationships with 13 overseas cities around the world. Among them, the six sister cities are: Lisbon, Porto, and Coimbra in Portugal; Linköping in Sweden; Praia in Cape Verde; and São Paulo in Brazil. The seven twin cities/towns are: Brussels in Belgium; Da Nang and Ho Chi Minh City in Vietnam; Siem Reap Province in Cambodia; Phuket Province in Thailand; Dili City in East Timor; and Agua Grande Region in São Tomé and Príncipe.

The MSAR leverages its strengths to serve the needs of the nation, adhering to the principles of government guidance and market operation. It focuses on five key areas: unimpeded trade, financial liquidity, people-to-people connectivity, cooperation with other cities in the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area, and cooperation in new fields. It fully utilises the roles of the business community, overseas Chinese community, and people from all walks of life to actively participate in and contribute to the high-quality development of the Belt and Road initiative. It implements the tasks outlined in the Five-Year Work List for Macao's Comprehensive Participation in and Contribution to the Belt and Road Initiative (2024-2028) and gives full play to the role of the Belt and Road Initiative Tax Academy (Macao).

In 2025 the value of Macao's exports to Belt and Road countries/ regions stood at 370 million patacas while the value of its imports from Belt and Road countries/ regions totalled 28.58 billion patacas.

Economy: Macao's revised gross domestic product (GDP) in 2025 stood at 418.04 billion patacas, representing a real growth of 4.7 percent year-on-year. The overall economic scale recovered to 89.6 percent of its 2019 level. In the first quarter of 2026, thanks to a significant increase in visitor arrivals, which boosted service exports, the revised GDP figure was 107.56 billion patacas, a year-on-year increase of 7.1 percent, and the total economic output recovered to 90.3 percent of the level in the same period in 2019. In the ranking of the richest countries and regions published by Global Finance Magazine in 2025, Macao ranked third globally. In the first quarter of 2026, the overall unemployment rate was 1.6 percent, and the unemployment rate for local residents was 2.1 percent. The median monthly income for employed local residents and the employed population in the first quarter was 22,000 patacas and 18,300 patacas, respectively. In April 2026, the composite consumer price index rose by 1.21 percent year-on-year.

Tourism and Gaming: Macao's gross gaming revenues in 2025 were 247.404 billion patacas, a year-on-year increase of 9.1 percent. Gaming tax revenues for the year stood at 94.855 billion patacas. Gross gaming revenues in the first five months of 2026 amounted to 108.379 billion patacas, a year-on-year increase of 10.9 percent. The total number of visitor arrivals in 2025 rose by 14.7 percent year-on-year to 40,069,360, breaking the 40 million mark. International visitors totalled 2,755,474, an increase of 13.7 percent year-on-year. In the first quarter of 2026, inbound visitors increased by 13.7% year-on-year to 11,213,904, while international visitors increased by 10.7% year-on-year.

Major Infrastructure Projects: Macao boasts a distinct geographical advantage and extensive international connections. With continuous expansion of external cooperation and optimisation of the business environment, its investment attractiveness continues to rise. The Guangdong-Macao In-Depth Cooperation Zone in Hengqin is an important platform for Macao to participate in the Greater Bay Area development and promote appropriate economic diversification. The MSAR Government will fully seize the strategic opportunities of "Macao + Hengqin," proactively integrate high-quality resources, and promote the construction of a number of landmark projects, including: the Macao-Hengqin International Education (University) City, the Macao International Integrated Tourism and Culture Zone, the Macao Pearl River West Bank International Air Transport Hub (Port), and the Macao Science and Technology R&D Industrial Park. These initiatives will promote high-quality development of the Greater Bay Area and Chinese-style modernisation, comprehensively building a crucial bridgehead for the nation's high-level opening-up.

Specialised Financial Services: The Monetary Authority of Macao successfully joined the multilateral central bank digital currency bridge (mBridge) in early 2026, and the system was officially launched on June 2. Of the 11 banks initially authorised to conduct related business, three have successfully completed their first batch of transactions on mBridge, totalling 23 cross-border transactions covering trade settlement and cross-border remittances. This marks a key step forward for Macao in the cross-border application of central bank digital currencies (CBDCs). Furthermore, the "Digital Macao Pataca" has entered the sandbox testing phase. The next phase will extend to e-government, public transportation, and school campuses, utilising relevant technologies to improve the efficiency of clearing and settlement through the Simple Pay platform.

According to statistics from the Chongwa (Macao) Financial Asset Exchange Co., Ltd., as of 31 May 2026, the total scale of bonds issued and listed in Macao reached 1,124.233 billion patacas, covering a variety of currencies and bonds. The direct linkage between the Macao Central Securities Depository (CSD) and the Central Moneymarkets Unit (CMU) of Hong Kong in 2025 recorded more than 140 primary and secondary market transactions with settlement amount of 10 billion patacas in equivalent. The Ministry of Finance has issued sovereign bonds in Macao for four consecutive years, with a cumulative value of 21 billion yuan. Guangdong Province has issued municipal government bonds in Macao for five consecutive years, including the issuance of themed bonds for the 15th National Games and blue bonds for the first time in 2025. Currently, the scale of various debt securities held in custody by the Macao Central Securities Depository and Clearing Limited (MCSD) exceeds 110 billion patacas in equivalent.

MICE and Culture & Sport: Macao's convention and exhibition industry has developed into an internationally recognised brand. In 2025, Macao was named Incentive Travel Destination of the Year and Best Destination for Annual Meetings at the M&C Stellar Awards, and for the third consecutive year (2023-2025), it was awarded "Best Convention Destination in Asia" and Best BT-MICE City. In 2025, there were a total of 1,861 MICE events, an increase of 22.1 percent year-on-year while the number of visitors/ participants rose by 10.7 percent to 1.473 million. Thanks to rapid growth in the fourth quarter, MICE events contributed approximately 6.28 billion patacas to the revenues of Macao's non-gaming sector, a year-on-year rise of 16.4 percent. The number of conventions and exhibitions in the first quarter of 2026 remained at 425, the same as in the first quarter of 2025, driving a 29.4% year-on-year increase in revenues from Macao's non-gaming sector to 840 million patacas.

In 2025, Macao successfully co-hosted the 15th National Games with Guangdong and Hong Kong for the first time in its history. Macao hosted many key events and showcased the image of "Vibrant Macao" through the integration of sports and cultural tourism. In addition, Macao hosted various international sports and cultural events every year, including the Macao Grand Prix, the Macao International Marathon, the Macao International Fireworks Display Contest, the FIVB Volleyball Women's Nations League, the Macao Open golf tournament, the International Dragon Boat Invitational Tournament, the Macao Arts Festival, and the Macao International Music Festival, with the aim of building Macao into a "City of Performing Arts" and a "City of Sports."

Macao-Hengqin Integration: The MSAR Government is committed to strengthening economic and trade exchanges and cooperation with provinces and cities in the Chinese mainland and actively participating in the development of the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area. In September 2021, the Central Government announced the Overall Plan for the Development of the Guangdong-Macao In-Depth Cooperation Zone in Hengqin, which provides clear directions for the development of the Cooperation Zone. Focusing on the main theme of "promoting Macao's appropriate economic diversification", it outlines four strategic orientations, aiming to build the Cooperation Zone into a new platform for promoting the appropriate diversification of Macao's economy, a new space for facilitating the lives and employment of Macao residents, a new model for enriching the practice of "One country, two Systems", and a new highland for promoting the construction of the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area. In December 2023, the State Council approved the Overall Development Plan for the Development of the Guangdong-Macao In-Depth Cooperation Zone in Hengqin (2022-2035), which focuses on the three stages of 2024, 2029, and 2035, proposing more specific development goals and setting a guiding blueprint for the future development of the Cooperation Zone.

The sixth-term Government has made it a major obligation to deliver the second-phase development goals of the Guangdong-Macao In-Depth Cooperation Zone in Hengqin. It set up in February 2025 a leading group for the promotion of the construction of the Guangdong-Macao In-depth Cooperation Zone in Hengqin. In June 2025, the Industrial Development Plan for the Guangdong-Macao In-Depth Cooperation Zone in Hengqin (2025-2029) was published, outlining the directions for industrial development in the Cooperation Zone over the next five years. In 2025, the Cooperation Zone achieved a gross domestic product (GDP) of 54.705

billion yuan, a year-on-year increase of 2.1 percent. In the first quarter of 2026, the gross domestic product in the Cooperation Zone stood at 14.273 billion yuan, up by 5.5 percent year-on-year. As at April 2026, the number of Macao-funded entities stood at 8,076 (including 7,950 Macao-funded enterprises), representing a year-on-year increase of 13.5 percent. Macao-funded entities accounted for 15.1 percent of all operating entities, an increase of 3.1 percentage points compared to the same period last year.
